An Important Message to our Members

The time has come to share a difficult issue with which the Wing Staff has been grappling for quite some time. We have known about it but were not able to find a solution.

Many of you know that we have been having a rough time for the past two years with our Wing's expenses exceeding our Wing's income. We struggled in 2008 with astronomical fuel prices and the adverse impact of that on air show opportunities. We also funded expensive hangar improvements required by the fire department. At the same time, we supported CAF Headquarter's need for additional funds through a 2.6 times increase in the Annual Unit Administrative Charge (ANUAC), a type of tax levied on the units based upon the type and number of aircraft they operate. Reduced income and increased expenses resulted in the Wing losing considerable money in 2008.

Things were not any better in 2009. While fuel prices came down somewhat and air show opportunities increased, we were still overwhelmed by the ANUAC requirements of CAF Headquarters and hangar improvements mandated by the fire department which carried over into 2009. Then our F8F *Bearcat* experienced a major engine failure and the Wing had to cover some \$20,000 in expenses over and above the available funds from aircraft reserve accounts and special *Bearcat* donations. The wing again will lose considerable money in 2009.

If we don't do anything different, the projection for 2010 is that the Wing will once again lose considerable money. Our ability to absorb major losses decreases with each passing year, and it is imperative that we do something different now so that we will be around for many years to come. 2010 has become the year where we can no longer talk about doing something, we must do something or run out of money. So your Wing Staff has chosen to make the difficult decisions, taking into account the efforts to increase revenue from non-aircraft activities, such as hangar event rentals and the Wine & Wings event.

We are looking at many things, but one stands out as a major expense that we can no longer afford, our C-46 *China Doll*.

China Doll has been our flagship, our first aircraft as the Southern California Wing, and there is great emotional attachment to the airplane by all wing members. It is also a major attraction to our museum visitors, and is one of the few museum aircraft anywhere that can be boarded by visitors. The fact remains, however, that our future health as the Southern California Wing depends upon reducing expenses, and reducing them now. The sad truth is that we can no longer afford to operate her. As cost cutting measures, we have deferred the repair of non-structural items, such as skin corrosion, for many years, and we can no longer defer them.

This aircraft is very expensive to operate and maintain, costing about \$1,800 per hour, and requires a large

number of non-revenue flight hours each year for pilot training and check rides. It is therefore impossible to recover it's operating costs through air shows. We have known this for several years and have tried a number of strategies to reduce non-revenue hours and not return the aircraft to Camarillo between air shows to reduce flight hours, but we were not able to put all that together in 2009 and make it work. If the airplane attends an air show only 300 miles away, it takes 4 flight hours and costs \$7,200. It is not possible to earn that much from appearance fees, tour, and PX income. In addition, the cost of non-revenue flight hours and check rides needs to be recovered.

In 2008 *China Doll* was undergoing maintenance all year to replace her corroded upper fuselage skin, did not fly, and she cost the Wing \$669. She did fly in 2009 and cost the Wing \$14,074. Unfortunately, both propellers require an expensive overhaul in early 2010 to be in compliance with applicable airworthiness directives, and the effort started in 2008 to remedy skin corrosion on the aircraft cannot be deferred indefinitely. A sobering evaluation of the financial and other resources required to keep *China Doll* airworthy and an aircraft we can be proud of has made it obvious that we do not have either the required funds, manpower, or resources to make this happen. No one has come forward to provide the funds required to keep her flying, and the Wing can no longer do it. Under the current CAF rules, we expect the cost to the Wing to keep *China Doll* as a static display aircraft to be about \$7,500 per year, and of that \$6,400 is the ANUAC assessment. This amount is a major portion of our projected 2010 losses.

We plan to explore the possibility of obtaining a reduced ANUAC assessment and keeping *China Doll* at Camarillo as a static display aircraft, since it is a major museum attraction and has symbolized the Southern California Wing for more than 25 years. Failing that, there is no alternative but to return the aircraft to CAF Headquarters to get out from under the \$7,500 minimum annual cost of keeping the aircraft under the current ANUAC formula, plus insurance.

It is regrettable that this action is being considered, but the ANUAC formula currently applied by CAF Headquarters places the large transports at a financial disadvantage. The elimination of the expenses associated with *China Doll* is insufficient by itself to balance the 2010 budget, and there will be additional actions taken by the Staff to reduce expenses, but these decisions will certainly be less controversial and far less painful.

As I said in my opening, this is a difficult issue, but one that must be dealt with to insure the Wing survives. It was my desire, and that of the Staff, that we fully disclose what we are contemplating to the Wing members.

Maintenance Officer's Report by Joe Peppito

PBJ/B-25 Mitchell: The Restoration Crew has been hard at work performing the sheetmetal repairs to the outer wing panels and wing flaps. They have also repaired the inner wing flap area. A lot of the inner and outer wing structural members had to be either replaced or repaired. The work is progressing well, but we are still a long way from home.

C-46 China Doll: The airplane is now in flying status and has been to a couple of airshows. Dick Troy, the C-46 Crew Chief, along with members of his crew, presented a report to the Wing Staff on November 21 concerning the maintenance needs of *China Doll*, and possible options for the future of this airplane.

F6F-5 Hellcat: This airplane is now in flying status with no known problems.

F8F-2 Bearcat: This airplane is also in flying status, and is running well since its engine change. We may have to do some propeller work in the future.

F-24 Argus: We still need to complete the fabric covering of the fuselage. Work on the internal cockpit installations needs to be completed before the covering is installed.

SNJ-4 Texan "Bluebird:" We were having landing gear locking problems, but the ace crew has solved that. We need to reinstall all the panels and covers before it can be checked out and flown again.

SNJ-5 Texan #290: After we changed the carburetor twice, we finally have the engine running properly. This airplane is now on flying status.

Mk XIV Spitfire: Les Bedding and his crew are still hard at work trying to complete the engine installation. This has got to be the most complex and complicated engine installation in existence. There are just so many lines, fittings, and components.

A6M3 Zero: We had to replace the tail wheel tire tube – which had a broken valve stem. The airplane is now in flying status.

PT-19A Cornell: This airplane is presently in flying status.

Mr. Joseph M. Vallejo, Aviation Occupational Teacher with the Ventura County Office of Education, would like to bring some of his students – about eight or ten boys and girls of high school age – to observe the renovation and maintenance procedures carried on in our Renovation Hangar. This will be on a future Thursday, probably in the afternoon.

We look forward to helping out these young people, and give them some knowledge of the aircraft and engines that flew in WWII. One of the goals of the CAF is to impart an appreciation of military aviation in the youth of today.

Invitation To The World of Aviation

To reach out to the future, you must understand what comes before. The CAF-Southern California Wing will be conducting a training program, open to all current and future CAF Cadets. The training class is projected to begin in January.

The training will be provided to young adults, boys and girls, ages thirteen to eighteen. The program will include both skills and aviation history. It will be presented by our member experts as well as by guest aviation speakers.

Classes will cover the development of the airplane from the days of the Wright Brothers to the development of the Space Shuttle, and will even include information on unmanned military aircraft. Aircraft design, operation and maintenance will be topics of discussion.

Those completing the course will receive a Certificate of Completion. The proposed start date for the classes will be January 9, 2010.

The classes will be conducted on Saturdays, with a one-hour session in the morning; a break for lunch; and then a one-hour class in the afternoon. The afternoon class will consist of an interesting speaker on an interesting aviation subject. These speakers will include military and commercial airline pilots and mechanics. 

LITTLE KNOWN TIDBIT OF NAVAL HISTORY...

The U. S. S. Constitution (Old Ironsides), as a combat vessel, carried **48,600 gallons of fresh water** for her crew of 475 officers and men. This was sufficient to last six months of sustained operations at sea. She carried no evaporators (i.e. fresh water distillers).

However, let it be noted that according to her ship's log, "On July 27, 1798, the U.S.S. Constitution sailed from Boston with a full complement of 475 officers and men, 48,600 gallons of fresh water, 7,400 cannon shot, 11,600 pounds of black powder and **79,400 gallons of rum.**"

Her mission: "To destroy and harass English shipping."

Making Jamaica on 6 October, she took on 826 pounds of flour and **68,300 gallons of rum.**

Then she headed for the Azores , arriving there 12 November. She provisioned with 550 pounds of beef and **64,300 gallons of Portuguese wine.**

On 18 November, she set sail for England . In the ensuing days she defeated five British men-of-war and captured and scuttled 12 English merchant ships, **salvaging only the rum** aboard each.

By 26 January, her powder and shot were exhausted. Nevertheless, although unarmed she made a night raid up the Firth of Clyde in Scotland . Her landing party captured a whisky distillery and transferred **40,000 gallons of single malt Scotch** aboard by dawn. Then she headed home.

The U. S. S. Constitution arrived in Boston on 20 February 1799, with no cannon shot, no food, no powder, **no rum, no wine, no whisky,** and 38,600 gallons of water.

To this day, the USS Constitution is a commissioned frigate in the U.S. Navy, berthed in Boston, MA.
