Air Show Report

Since the last issue of Flight Line, your Wing attended two air shows. These were the last that we will attend until late in the first quarter of 2007.

Thermal Air Show

We left for Thermal on Friday the 3rd of November @ 9:30 a.m. We had an escort of the F6F and the F8F for the entire flight. When we arrived over the airport, the fighters stayed in formation with us. This was quite a sight to see. During the show a number of people remarked that it was a terrific sight. We landed at 10:25 a.m. We were directed to our parking spot, where we cleaned the plane and were refueled. We were greeted by Veronica, who gave us our packet and arranged for us to meet Vicki the Van Driver, who would be transporting us to and from the hotel. She also went out of her way to drop us off at Terry Cedar's house for a BBQ he and Ann organized for all of us (fighter pilots included), plus a few of their friends.

The Thermal Air Show has become the high point of the Air Show season from the perspective of the members working the show. This is due to the incomparable hospitality of the Cedars. Thank you Ann, thank you Terry for such a warm and wonderful experience at your home.

Saturday was gorgeous. We took the early van to the show (6:30 a.m.) in order to set up and be ready for the crowd. Even though the show started at 9:00 a.m., the gates opened early for there was a pancake breakfast starting at 6:00 a.m. We were completely ready to go by 8:00 a.m.

It was a good show. Our parking spot was good for the crowd, but a bit of a problem when we were trying to leave. We earned \$2,507 from the PX and Tours plus an additional \$800 as our appearance fee. Additionally we received 800 gallons of fuel.

We arrived at Camarillo at approximately 5:00 p.m.

Nellis AFB AVIATION NATION AIR SHOW

We left for Nellis AFB on Thursday, November 9 at 10:00 a.m. We arrived at 11:50 a.m., just 10 minutes prior to our original ETA. We were met by base personnel, who arranged for our plane to be fueled and took us to base transportation and housing. I checked everyone into the Air Force Hotel. I returned to the plane where the group had finished cleaning it. Lips, our Air Force liaison officer, arrived while I was there to see if there was anything that we needed. At that point in time everything was fine.

Friday we opened the plane @ 8:00 a.m. for the base people. We didn't charge for tours, but we left the donation box out in the plane. We collected \$60. It was during this time that I started to suspect that our parking place wasn't the best in the world. We were right in front of an entry gate, but it was closed. As it turns out, we were off the beaten track by about 200 yards. Also, we had no PX due to the exorbitant vendor fee we would have had to pay up front. So we decided to rely just on tours for revenue.

Saturday was a miserable day. There was a high overcast, and it was windy, with temperatures in the 50's. Foot traffic was low because we were away from the mainstream of visitors and the weather was bad, which impacted the number of people attending the show. We collected \$659 for the day for tours. Not a great day. You could shoot a cannon off in the area we were located and no one would hear it. I estimate that between 3 and 5% of the people in attendance walked by our plane and about 5% of those took the tour. Our parking place was TERRIBLE!!!! We closed up shop about 4:00 p.m., which was about 15 minutes after the crowd started its exodus. We went back to the hotel to clean up and met for dinner.

Sunday was clear but colder, partially because the wind was stronger than Saturday. The crowd seemed smaller and our tour money was less – \$524.

Monday morning as we were preparing to leave, I talked to the fuel truck driver to see if he had any extra fuel and could he top us off if he did. Not only did he top us off, but drove to Camarillo to give us the remaining fuel at a cost which was considerably less than the \$3.50 per gallon fuel was selling for on the open market.

This was the last Air Show of the season. A photo of our C-131 crew is on the Wing Photo Page I on page 5.

CAF Election Results

In our CAF – SoCAWing elections of staff officers for 2007, Steve Barber, of Camarillo, was elected as our new Wing Leader, replacing Casey de Bree, who has served admirably for the past four years. Steve will assume the mantle as of January 1, 2007, and will serve for two years.

Two other new Wing officers were elected to serve two-year terms. Jason Somes, of Simi Valley, was elected to be our new Executive Officer, and Joe Peppito, of Newbury Park, was elected as our Maintenance Officer.

A total of sixty-six ballots were cast in our Wing election, a significant increase over previous years.

We congratulate the new officers, and commend the outgoing officers – Casey de Bree, Dave Long and Dick Troy – for their dedication to making our Wing one of the elite organizations in all of the Commemorative Air Force. They have left large footprints for the new officers to fill.

On the national scene – our new Wing Leader, Steve Barber, was elected to the CAF General Staff with a total of 421 votes, 26 more than the runner-up, Mark Novak. Joe Cowan was the third candidate to win election to the General Staff, with 346 votes. Of special note: Steve was not among the official nominees for the General Staff, but was nominated from the floor at the General Membership Meeting in October. He now will wear two caps – one for CAF SoCAWing Leader and one for CAF General Staff. Congrats, Steve – we're very proud of you! (by the way, you are on latrine duty next week).
