### June's Featured Quilter:

#### Melinda Rials

Like the previous two featured quilters (June Rittscher and June Daniels), Melinda is a native Floridian and has lived in Florida all her life. She was born in Orange Park because, at the time, there was no hospital in Green Cove Springs. Melinda and her family moved to Jacksonville when she was four years old.

Melinda has been quilting for more than 15 years. She made her first quilts for her grandchildren. She learned to quilt by reading how-to books, and her first quilts were made using traditional patterns. She has expanded her repertoire over the years, and she likes creating small art quilts and enjoys the challenge of trying something new.

A Guild member for five years, Melinda has served as Vice President and as chair of the Guild QuiltFest booth. She also has presented on Guild Demo Day. Melinda enjoys learning from other quilters, the exposure to different types of quilts and the shared enthusiasm for fiber arts among Guild members. She also appreciates the opportunities to contribute to charities and values the many friendships gained from Guild membership. Last year, Melinda entered a quilt in the QuiltFest challenge, "Birds of a Feather." Her entry, titled "Featherweight Champ," earned an Honorable Mention and a Judge's Recognition.

In addition to quilting, Melinda enjoys rug hooking, needle felting, reading and gardening. She has both a butterfly garden and an herb garden. Flowers in her butterfly garden include milkweed, Echinacea, rudbeckia and cardinal flowers. The garden attracts many different types of butterflies, including monarchs and swallowtails. In fact, Melinda has to plant extra parsley in her herb garden because it's a food source for swallowtail caterpillars. When her grandchildren were small she helped them collect the butterfly chrysalises so they could watch them develop into butterflies.

Melinda is married to Dennis, and she has two adult sons and an adult stepson. She has four grandchildren, three granddaughters and one grandson. Melinda says she used to tell her grandson he was her favorite grandson. She says that worked until he realized he was also her only grandson.

Melinda says that she is VERY happy to be a RETIRED elementary school teacher. During her teaching career she taught at R.L. Brown, John Love and Abess Park Elementary Schools. She taught first and second grades, ran a science lab in a magnet school and taught in Project EDGE (a program designed to increase the number of students eligible for the Gifted program) for grades one through four. She finished her teaching career at Abess Park Elementary School where she taught gifted children from kindergarten through fifth grade.

Melinda says that most people don't know that she has ridden in a hot-air balloon. She says that her husband has also promised her a parachute jump and a hang-glider ride before she is "totally decrepit." Sounds very adventurous!

Many Guild members have seen the beautiful things that Melinda makes from wool. She first became interested in working with wool when she needed a rug but could not find one she liked in the store. She read how-to books (Melinda believes that you can do anything, if you can read about it) and started looking for wool garments in second-hand stores. She washed the clothes in hot water and dried them on the high temperature setting to felt the wool. She then cut the wool into narrow strips and taught herself to hook rugs. Since becoming interested in quilting, she has learned to appliqué with wool and uses a blanket stitch to attach the appliques to the background. Melinda says she enjoys working with wool because it does not fray and needles beautifully. She still looks in thrift shops for wool clothing and felts her own wool, but she says if she ever comes across hand-dyed wool in quilt shops she buys it immediately. Melinda recently attended a local meeting of the Fiber Artists Network where the program included demonstrations of dip and spot dyeing. According to Melinda, this technique is intriguing, and she is thinking it may be her next challenging endeavor. We'll be waiting to see the results.

### Special, But with Wavy Edges

Unfortunately, I have no claim to fame. You may find me as an item in a garage sale 100 years from now. That fear of being unknown and unwanted prompts me to tell you my story. There is a place in history and especially in the history of quilts of my kind. Four years ago I was hung near the entrance of a regional quilt show, one of over 300 beauties and I thought, surely the judge would take note of how special I was in design and craftsmanship. Her only comment was, "Your edges are wavy!" Having duly been crushed in spirit, I consoled myself by awarding myself a blue ribbon in a new classification: Quilts wavy edges. How many other so-called experts at this exhibition recognized the original 1940 design of Mr. William Pinch, "Quilt Block Specialist" of Cleveland, Ohio, actually a team of father and daughter who published quilt block designs in the local paper.

During the Depression era their designs were eagerly sought by women who loved needlework. Many of the patterns were of embroidery and because they were more delicate and decorative, the housewife thought of the resulting quilt as being a "spread", and not an everyday quilt. Perhaps this accounts for my feeling that I, as a quilt, was a cut above the patchwork sisters made of shirttails, flour sacks, dress scraps, old petticoats and sugar bags. My fabric had been specially purchased from Mr. Pinch.

The lady who bought my design squares carried me to Aunt Pauline's house each Thursday afternoon. Other women gathered there to work on their own quilts or they worked on a quilt already stretched on a frame. It was a fun time for everyone. Aunt Pauline and Uncle Lou, her husband, had personalities which lifted everyone's spirits. You visited them because it would be an afternoon or evening of entertainment and laughter. For those of us who remember the times during the Depression, the quilting afternoons represented simple, inexpensive homemade pleasure. There were hard times for everyone, the domino effect of having very little spending money. I was purchased for \$1.00 and a three-cent stamp, the cost of all of my 12 stamped squares.

The embroidery was eventually finished but the bias strips, called sashes, were a problem. I was never finished. The lady's daughter found me, folded and tucked away in a cedar chest. She gently opened seams, pressed each square and sash and lovingly made me whole. How fortunate I was to have another eager quilter take me in hand. She ran her needle and thread through my body thousands of times as she created her own quilting design around the original embroidery, but I didn't mind. Who would want to be left unfinished, like an unbaked pie?

Wouldn't Mr. William Pinch and his daughter, "Quilt Block Specialists," be proud of me? Even with wavy edges.
