Some recipes that were served at the Compass Centre Camp

Breakfast Casserole

Spray 9 x 13 pan

Layer -- Croissant Rolls (Sam's 50% larger)
Cooked sausage 1 to 1 ½ lb.
Cheddar cheese
11 eggs plus salt & pepper

Bake -- 375° until done (about 1 hour)

Serves 15 to 20

Bread Pudding Casserole

Spray 9 x13 pan

Layer -- Cubed Oregon Trail Raisin Bread (at Sam's)
Cream Cheese Frosting
Cubed Oregon Trail Raisin Bread

Mix and pour over layers:
8 eggs
2 ½ cups cream
6 T. melted butter

Cover and refrigerate over night.

Remove cover and bake at 375° until done (about 1 hour)

DID YOU KNOW?

Here are some of the amazing cuts you can make from a fat quarter:

- 99 — 2” squares or
- 56 — 2-1/2” squares or
- 42 — 3” squares or
- 30 — 3-1/2” squares or
- 20 — 4” squares or
- 16 — 4-1/2” squares or
- 12 — 5” squares or
- 12 — 5-1/2” squares or
- 9 — 6” squares or
- 6 — 6-1/2” squares

QUILTING TIPS

In paper piecing, before pressing freezer paper to your fabric, punch a small hole in the paper. When you are finished, you can put your needle in the hole and it pulls right off.

When quilting with “invisible thread”, the nylon that’s as fine as hair, place a small piece of masking tape on the machine just above the needle. When you cut the thread, you have a place to stick it so that it won’t come out of the needle.

If you have a wall hanging that, despite your best efforts, doesn’t hang flat against your wall, try adding a small sleeve to the bottom of the backing and slip in one of those freebie yardsticks (or similar flat wood). It won’t add a lot of obvious weight or bulk, but may get rid of those nagging wrinkles.

The Quilt of Life

As I faced my Maker at the last judgment, I knelt before the Lord along with all the other souls. Before each of us laid our lives like the squares of a quilt in many piles. An Angel sat before each of us sewing our quilt squares together into a tapestry that is our life. But as my angel took each piece of cloth off the pile, I noticed how ragged and empty each of my squares was. They were filled with giant holes. Each square was labeled with a part of my life that had been difficult, the challenges and temptations I was faced with in everyday life. I saw hardships that I endured, which were the largest holes of all. I glanced around me. Nobody else had such squares. Other than a tiny hole here and there, the other tapestries were filled with rich color and the bright hues of worldly fortune. I gazed upon my own life and was disheartened. My angel was sewing the ragged pieces of cloth together, threadbare and empty, like binding air. Finally the time came when each life was to be displayed, held up to the light, the scrutiny of truth. The others rose, each in turn, holding up their tapestries. So filled their lives had been. My angel looked upon me, and nodded for me to rise. My gaze dropped to the ground in shame. I hadn't had all the earthly fortunes. I had love in my life, and laughter. But there had also been trials of illness, and death, and false accusations that took from me my world, as I knew it. I had to start over many times. I often struggled with the temptation to quit, only to somehow muster the strength to pick up and begin again. An awe-filled gasp filled the air. I gazed around at the others who stared at me with wide eyes. Then, I looked upon the tapestry before me. Light flooded the many holes, creating an image, the face of Christ. Then our Lord stood before me, with warmth and love in His eyes. He said, "Every time you gave over your life to Me, it became My life, My hardships, and My struggles. Each point of light in your life is when you stepped aside and let Me shine through, until there was more of Me than there was of you." May all our quilts be threadbare and worn, allowing Christ to shine through.
